






OUR HISTORY

When an alcoholic gains the confidence of another by having this conversation, both the newcomer and the A.A. member benefit.


The Intergroup Central Office is updating the 12 Step Call List!

Area 1 Needs Your Help!

HELP US ACHIEVE THE 2024 AREA 1 BUDGET DEFICIT ELIMINATION EFFORT BY INCREASING YOUR CONTRIBUTIONS!

WHAT EXACTLY IS THE PROBLEM?

Area I is tracking towards a \$7,200 budget shortfall in 2024.

Why did this happen?

- We have experienced significant cost increases due to outside economic forces beyond our control.
- We had requests from the fellowship to increase budgets for certain committees.
- We need to relocate the Assembly due to our current locations inability to host past 2024.

What has been done about this problem so far?

- Area I Assembly passed the 2024 budget in October 2023, understanding we'd have a surplus that we wanted to draw down appropriately to 7th Tradition guidelines in 2024. The Finance Committee also needed a little time to see how contribution and expense flows matched up to previous years, so we could give the fellowship an accurate estimate of the shortfall.
- An AD HOC committee has been formed to determine alternative Area | Assembly venues – significant cost increases are inevitable.
- We negotiated down available options regarding certain costs to the Assembly such as: storage building fee contracts, consolidated equipment, cost savings for processing contributions.
- Area Finance Committee has provided accurate information for the Assembly to make an informed decision.

So what does Area I need exactly?

Increased contributions from the Area I fellowship.


